On Sunday, August 28, Hurricane Irene passed through the Metropolitan New York Synod territory and moved north and east, causing a deluge of record-breaking floods and winds. Among the hardest-hit towns in the Catskills were the towns of Prattsville and Fleischmanns.

Soon after the flood waters carried away houses, cars, trees, and people in Prattsville, Pastor Sonja Maclary of Christ's Lutheran Church in Woodstock received information and pictures of the devastation there from friends. Flood waters with the power of Niagara Falls had washed through the center of town, lifting many houses and businesses right off of their foundations.

Pastors Greg and Becky Town, colleagues of Pr. Maclary's friends, serve the Dutch Reformed Church of Prattsville. While the church and the parsonage remained standing, the family barely escaped. The church was so damaged that it was necessary to gut the interior up to seven feet above the flooring in the sanctuary. Parsonage damage caused the pastors to lose all their belongings on the first floor, along with many church records. The church's fellowship hall, which had housed the Prattsville Head Start program, had to be torn down.
