FROM THE PASTOR:

Wishing Our Life Away

Last month I turned 64. Someone asked me, what did it feel like? My immediate response was, "It felt like a year closer to Medicare!" The countdown is on! Yet, that sounds like wishing a year of my life away, and I guess that it is.

When I was young, I couldn't wait until I was old enough to take communion, to drive, to drink, to vote, to be old enough to work full-time...and then, whoa, put on the brakes! Turning 30...wasn't too bad, but 40 was a rough year. Middle age appeared out of nowhere! Then it was 50, 60 and now looking down the road to retirement at some point and of course...Medicare!

Too often we wish our life away. Sometimes, we have very good reasons. Perhaps there's a medical issue, a surgery, a test that we want done and over with. Maybe there's a problem or issue that if only we could move time forward, it would be resolved. Then there are decisions that we are reluctant to make and wish we could peek ahead and see the outcome.

Of course, we know that we cannot move the hands of time. We all just have this moment, right this second that God has given us with no guarantees for the next one.

How does one stay in this moment? Prayer is one way. Doing something where your full attention is needed is another. I have more consistently in the past few months added meditation. I use an app called "10 Percent Happier." It has changed my consistency from occasional time to meditate to almost everyday. I have tied it in with monitoring my blood pressure and it has helped put my BP in the normal range.

I view meditation like a form of prayer. I am communicating with my body, specifically my breath. When my mind wanders, as it always does, I don't judge it...just bring it back to the breath. It is just that simple.

The gospels remind us that Jesus often took time alone for himself. "But Jesus often withdrew to lonely places and prayed." (NIV Luke 5:16).

Jesus stayed in the present moment with whoever he was with and whatever the circumstances. We are asked to do the same and we often need to, especially for ourselves.

Progress Toward Our Joint Call

During our annual meeting last January, we discussed at length, that we would begin working with our brothers and sisters at Trinity to formulate a process by which we could share a single pastor. During the past several months this work has progressed to the point that I anticipate we will be able to formalize this agreement during our upcoming annual congregational meeting.

Two separate workgroups have been proceeding in parallel. The first, which includes Joe Bostian, Dave Rylance, and I have been working with our Trinity counterparts to establish a covenant between our congregations that defines how the process will work. The second group, Renee Brenner, Janet Marz, and Dave Rylance, has been working with the Trinity team to develop the joint, ministry site profile that will serve as the resume of our congregations that will be reviewed by prospective pastors once we enter into the call process.

There is frequently a misunderstanding of what the covenant and joint call process mean to us. First and foremost – This is <u>NOT</u> a merger of the congregations. Each of the congregations will continue to maintain its own identity, have its own constitution, its own budget, and its own council. Each congregation will continue to be responsible for the upkeep and maintenance of its own buildings and properties. Each congregation will maintain its own office, and hold its own service on Sunday mornings. In our case, the covenant is an agreement to call a pastor that will be shared by our two congregations. It stipulates in some detail that we will share equally in the cost of paying the pastor and outlines a process for governance for the joint endeavor. As mentioned before, each congregation will continue to have its own council, the covenant identifies the need to also create a new, joint council consisting of three people from each congregation that will serve as the administrative body for the joint venture.

Of course, some logistical changes will need to be made in order to make this all possible. Most obviously, Sunday morning worship times for both congregations are going to have to change to allow the pastor time to complete the first service and travel the three blocks to the second. At present, both congregations hold their council meetings on the 2nd Tuesday of each month. Since the pastor is an integral part of the council, it will be necessary for the council meetings to be held on different days too. Although change is never easy, I hope that you will agree that these are relatively minor changes that do not affect our core mission or sense of unity.

So where do we go from here? The first drafts of both the covenant and ministry site profile are being refined by the authoring groups. During November, a joint Redeemer / Trinity council meeting will be held for the specific purpose of reviewing and approving the covenant. Next, each council (separately) will identify and nominate the three individuals who are to serve on the first-ever, common council. During the January 2020 annual congregational meetings, each congregation will be asked to review and approve entering into the covenant. Once the covenant is officially signed by both congregations, we can then together, enter into the call process, using the ministry site profile that is being developed by the second team.

Change is never easy but jointly calling a pastor in this way will go a long way toward solidifying the longterm position of both congregations. In the coming weeks, I plan to share additional details about the process in the form of a presentation during our social hour. In the meantime, I welcome your questions and comments. Feel free to bring them to my attention after worship or whenever you see me.

While some of the changes were scary with the unknowns at the time of the change, I "fall" back on the visual aid of seeing tree leaves changing colours and remembering there is a time for everything and everything in its time and place my trust into God's hands. —Vicar Scott Harvey

Thank you for your generous donation to the Kingston Back Pack Program. We are grateful for your gift to this important program.

We believe the Back Pack program provides a straightforward and tangible solution to childhood weekend hunger. Our partner schools agree; most of our Back Pack programs operate at full capacity with a waiting list. This trend highlights two important facts: Our partner schools see the value and impact of the Back Pack program for their food insecure students, and the need within their schools continues to be high.

The Food Bank's Back Pack Program partners with 223 schools in 21 counties. Each Friday, we send bags of food home with 6,500 students. During the 2017-18 school year, we distributed over 186,000 backpacks containing over 1.1 million meals directly into the hands of hungry children. We expect to exceed that number this school year as we partner with new schools to bring the Back Pack program to more hungry kids.
