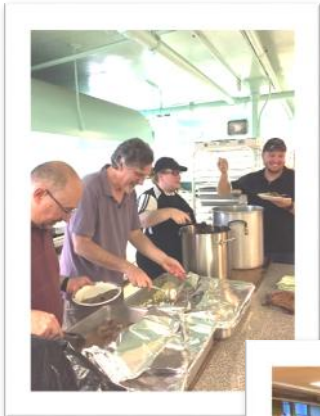

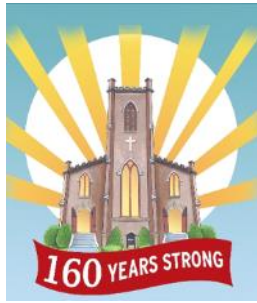
SAUERBRATEN DINNER

Pastor's Message

"For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted." -Luke 14:11

Dear Friends in Christ,

Thank you to our Deacon Peter Slingerland, and to our dear friend, Rev. Arlene Wilhelm, for shepherding the First Lutheran flock in my absence and leading worship on the two Sundays I was away on vacation. As most of you know, I had the privilege of returning to Geneva, Switzerland to stay with friends from the United Nations and to renew friendships with former colleagues from my days as a consultant with the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) and as a staff member of the World Council of Churches. But my primary purpose for being in Europe was to attend a reunion of my secondary school classmates from King George the Fifth School (KGV) in Hong Kong. Some of us had been in touch over the years, but for others of us, it was the first time we had seen each other in 49 years! And it was just wonderful how we could pick up where we left off and feel the old friendships reactivating, deepened, somehow, by the passing of years and the hard-earned wisdom gleaned through an amazing variety of life experiences.

I spent the whole time away feeling incredibly humbled by the privilege of having this rare opportunity to reconnect with people I love and have missed over the years. As we greeted each other around the traditional round table of a SoHo restaurant in London's Chinatown, we searched each other's eyes to reassure ourselves that yes, our 17 and 18 year old selves were still there, locked safely inside those wrinkly faces and slower-moving bodies. The evening was characterized by JOY! And also tinged with a poignancy stemming from the dramatic struggle for democracy happening simultaneously in the beloved home of our youth: Hong Kong. Some of us had hoped for a 50th reunion back in Hong Kong in 2020; now we are uncertain about what comes next.

And then there was the uncertainty of the local Brexit struggles going on in Parliament and the divisions it has caused throughout Great Britain echoing the current political divide in the USA. Thankfully, we did not spend much of our precious time talking about divisions. We focused on each other, our families, our life stories, our sorrows and joys; our deep appreciation for the years we spent together at KGV and in Hong Kong. We talked about the lack of divisions in our school – precisely because of our diversity as a student body. When just about every one of us came from a different part of the globe, how in the world would you even begin to grasp the meaning of xenophobia? We felt humbled, together, by the gift of our upbringing....Humbled and so incredibly grateful!

On Sunday, September 1, 2019, I worshipped at Westminster Abbey. Accorded a courtesy I was not expecting as a visiting member of the clergy, I was escorted to the ornately carved quire (choir) stalls (the section where the Royal Family sits on famous occasions such as royal weddings and funerals) near the high altar and only feet from the choir for this sung service. I thought I had died and gone to heaven! The music was glorious; the setting unbelievable; and the homily, based on Luke 14: 1, 7-14 by The Rev. Christopher Stoltz, I thought, was excellent and timely. So, of course, I took notes.

Rev. Stoltz, (the "Minor Canon and Precentor") spoke about how, in recent society, there has been a shift from a culture of self-denial to a culture of self-promotion. The new mantra is "all about me." But in a world of overwhelming needs, Rev. Stoltz cautioned, humility must be the foundation for the spiritual life necessary for the advancement of holiness in our daily lives. In order to imitate Christ, we must grow in humility. And then he quoted some steps for how to grow in Christ-like humility that he had once heard: *1. Be thankful. 2. Be self-critical before God, as genuinely humble people have a sharp moral compass. 3. Be compassionate with yourself in true humility. 4. Do not worry about status. 5. Use your sense of humor, because in the end, we are all infinitesimally small in God's universe.*



The homily ended with a quote from St. Augustine:

"If you should ask me what are the ways of God, I would tell you that the first is humility, the second is humility, and the third is humility. Not that there are no other precepts to give, but if humility does not precede all that we do, our efforts are fruitless."

Our world needs more humility, as Jesus, by the example of his life and death taught us. Our worldly leaders need more humility, as 16 year-old Greta Thunberg, the Swedish climate advocate, has shown us through her humble leadership, courage and sacrifice. I need more humility in my daily walk of faith. Because it isn't all about me, or you, or our political leaders. It is all about Christ's sacrifice for our sakes: GRACE!

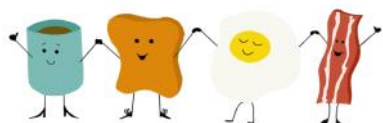
Bring in your broken treasures for fix-it help and advice!

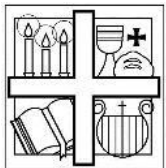

A LETTER from the CONGREGATIONAL Council

I've always been interested in myths and legends. One of my favorites and one of the most well-known is Arthurian legend, and particularly the legend of Merlin. When I was in middle school, I read a series of books called "*The Lost Years of Merlin*" by T.A. Barron. About 6 years ago T.A. Barron gave a commencement speech at Oxford titled "*The Wisdom of Merlin: 7 Magical Words for a Meaningful Life*," which was later released as a book. Merlin's magical words are Gratitude, Courage, Knowledge, Belief, Wonder, Generosity, and Hope, but an extra word is thrown in as well- Love.

In the Belief section of the book, T.A. Barron speaks about looking in "small, unremarkable places" to find his belief, though he acknowledges that people may find their belief in any number of things or places. When I think of our church, I find my inspiration to believe because of all the wonderful people who give selflessly of their time and energy. T.A. Barron also mentions that it is best to share our belief through our actions, rather than through our words. This is especially resonant with me as we enter the church dinner season and the approaching holiday season when our members are driven to give even more of their time and talents.

The other section of the speech that makes me think of our church is the Love section. This may not be surprising considering a common theme in our sermons is "Blah, Blah, Blah... Love." (Pastor's words, not mine!) In this section, Love is described as "a rope that can stretch itself infinitely." This rope can unite either large or small numbers of people and can encapsulate the world around us as well. At First Lutheran our rope is like the universe, constantly expanding to include our members and our community. We wield our love like our belief- in our actions.

While I may have only mentioned 2 of Merlin's words, I think we could find that each one is applicable to our church in some way. I think T.A. Barron's Merlin would be proud of our members, and perhaps like me he would find his inspiration to believe.
