


The 2019 FELC Annual Meeting was held on January 13, after a potluck lunch. It was very well attended.

A message from the Deacon 's Desk~

On January 20th, I was supposed to lead the service and give the sermon since Pastor Deborah is on medical leave with the surgery she has had. But God stepped in, like He does frequently, and brought ample snow and ice to cancel the service. It was the right thing to do with the weather being what it was.

The gospel that day was from John 2 about the wedding at Cana with Jesus performing His first miracle. As many stories from the New Testament, the gospel text included other things that we should understand along with the actions that Jesus did as part of the story itself.

The story in the gospel has Jesus attending a wedding with His mother Mary. As the gospel writer has it, this story is one of only two stories in John that includes Mary. The only other time Mary shows up in the gospel of John, is when Jesus is crucified and she is seen at the foot of the cross that Jesus is hung on.

The other interesting things from this gospel story is some of the language that is used that might confuse many readers of this story. Some of the language actually helps guide us to other stories that are in John. First the language that could confuse or trouble us.

When Jesus talks to His mother Mary, He doesn't call her Mother or Mom or Mary. He calls her "Woman". Have you ever called your mother, WOMAN? I would guess not.

When they are told the wine is gone and Mary goes and tells Jesus, "They have no wine." And He continues by saying, "What concern is that to you and to me?" At this point, Mary takes over and tells the servants to do what Jesus tells them to do. They do and the water becomes wine.

Some of the other language that John uses is probably not troubling, but points us to important events later in Jesus life. The language in John that refers to a miracle performed by Jesus is called a "sign", not a miracle. A "sign" shows believers that other events will happen to show Jesus is the Son of God. During Jesus life, other people were known for some miracles, so John uses the word "sign" to differentiate Jesus from the others.

At the beginning of this gospel reading, John uses the language "on the third day". Why does John say it this way? It's also probably leading us to Jesus crucifixion. John includes this story of Jesus turning water to wine. Again, it's to lead us to His last supper and the Eucharist.

The last verse of this story in the gospel of John mentions that "Jesus did this, the first of His signs...and revealed His glory, and his disciples believed in Him."

John wrote his stories so everyone would believe Jesus is the Son of God. His stories make up our life stories as well. Our life stories include Jesus so others will know Jesus gives us purpose throughout our lives. May we continue to keep Jesus at the center of our lives so our life stories will be remembered by everyone we touch. And I pray that they find and we continue to make Jesus part of their life as well.

Saturday February 9th from 9:30am-12:30pm


“sPOKe” takes donations of old bikes, makes them rideable, and gets them out to people in the community.
