It quickly became very clear that a random call to the synod in an almost desperate attempt to execute my *original* plan was really, the whole time, part of God's much higher Plan. With a capital "P."

Lof people's busy worlds and self-made plans, can be a difficult thing to do. Yet here, in this place, the Spirit has spoken—loudly—and Marlies and I heard it, as spoken through all of you. Through your love; your connection to us; your enthusiasm; your joy; and your trust. Our plan has now become your plan. God's Plan. We could not be happier to find that Poughkeepsie is where we belong—at St. John's, together with you! Thank you for making this commitment to us. We look forward with eager anticipation to our new life together: shepherding, serving, in community with you.

support of St. John's!



My name is Katie Thorn. I attended the ELCA Youth Leadership Summit on behalf of the Metro NY Synod. The Summit was held at Carol Joy Holling camp in Ashland, Nebraska. During my time there I got to meet other youth from around the country who were there representing their synods. We talked a lot about our congregations, synods, and the experiences that we have had because of being active in our congregations.

The focus of our time together was advocacy. Kevin Strickland introduced us to the concept of faith based advocacy using Philippians 2:1-5 and the story of the Good Samaritan. As Christians, we are called to model selfless love as Christ did. We do this through caring for our neighbors in many ways. He reminded us that Martin Luther defined "neighbors" as anyone our life touches. His broad definition of neighbor calls us to advocacy.

Abbi Hull, an ELCA Hunger Advocacy Fellow, spent the weekend with us and talked about advocacy being a place where youth and teenagers have a real voice. Abbi talked about how we can use our place in the church to speak to issues that affect the global community. She told us that when people from the church speak up about issues facing the world, leaders and policy makers listen because the words of faith leaders carry a moral weight. Abbi also talked about the needs of a community, such as hunger, will shape their local congregation; advocacy benefits us all.

Dr. Laura Hartman from Roanoke College spoke to us about environmental issues and advocacy surrounding them. Environmental issues are extremely complex and are often interconnected with other social justice issues such as race and class. Those causing the most damage to the environment are often the least affected. For example, rising sea levels in parts of the world (Alaska and the Gulf Coast) have resulted in some of the worlds first environmental refugees. Dr. Laura said that even though these issues are extremely complex, the small things we do can make a huge impact. She named our congregations as a great place to start practicing environmental advocacy and using our voices. She talked about churches that have community gardens, green spaces, and solar panels.

I attended a workshop on racial justice with Nicolette Faison. We played a version of monopoly that Nicolette had adapted. Her version gave real life advantages and disadvantages based on the race and gender of your game character. Everyone in the room was very astonished by the real life wage gaps that exist and how much of a difference they make. Nicolette also talked about her difficulty getting called to a church as a young African American female. She has been out of seminary for two years.

My other workshop selection was AMPARRO. AMPARRO stands for "Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities". They seek to protect these children by working with them and by advocating for policy surrounding the border, immigration, unaccompanied minors, and refugees. The Speaker from AMPARRO, Alaide, was able to share so many stories of the ELCA making a difference in the lives of individuals who find themselves in terrible circumstances. She told the story of a man who's refugee status was denied. The ELCA was able to help him obtain a micro loan in his home country to start a bakery.

One of my favorite experiences from the summit was "Candle Time". This was an hour of quiet reflection. There were at least 15 different prayer and reflection stations set up to experience. One of the prayer stations was glueing traced and decorated hands onto the event banner. We had done this with our hands the night before not knowing what they would be used for. It was really cool to see all the hands come together on the theme banner. My favorite station was a reflection wall. There were several inspirational quotes and pictures hung on the wall for us to reflect on. My life, like everyone elses, is very busy. I really liked this whole hour set aside to connect with God through prayer and reflection.

I am very grateful to have had this opportunity and thank all that St. John's, the Metro NY Synod and the ELCA did to make it come together.
