Participants want to deepen their life of faith. Although this course of study is used by students who wish to continue on to become a Rostered Deacon in our synod, it is not a requirement of the classes to go on to serve in this way. (In fact, the majority of graduates do not go on to become Deacons)

What is diakonia?

diakonia is a national program of education for people in the Lutheran church. It was developed by a Lutheran pastor to help develop dynamic disciples. While the program is designed to be completed in two years, some students take more time.

It includes twelve courses, six per academic year. Each course is 5 sessions in length, and meets weekly for one 3 hour session. Assignments and reading reflect the twin purposes of relating subject matter to the students' context of life and ministry (family, parish, neighborhood area of ministry), and giving a solid background to the topic.

Topics include: Old and New Testament studies, Church History, Christian Ethics, Worship, Visitation, Spirituality and Church Doctrine.

Students work at their own level, and assignments reflect the understanding that students are already busy in their families, jobs, and parish. Typically, students average approximately two to four hours of studies per week in addition to class time.
